The issue is not so much around how the tax is raised, but how it is spent. A system could be implemented whereby 90% of a local tax raised was spent by Council's as it is now, but the remaining 10% would be spent according to the tax payers wishes. For example, local tax payers could be given a choice of three areas (e.g. schools, roads, social care) where 10% of their tax would be spent. This money would be ring-fenced and be genuinely additional to the money already budgeted to be spent in that area in a given year.

This system would give tax payers more ownership of the local tax and spending systems and give them more of a choice over how their money is spent.

Generally speaking, people should pay more local tax, so this system could be a way of making people accept an increase in the taxes they pay.
